Established in 2013 under the West Bengal Act XXXVII of 2012, Diamond Harbour Women's University (DHWU) holds the distinction of being the first women's university in West Bengal and Eastern India. DHWU has become a solution for female students seeking self-discovery and academic fulfilment, not just regionally but across West Bengal. The university is situated on Diamond Harbour Road, a burgeoning educational hub southwest of Kolkata. Admissions

- **Eligibility:** Applicants must have passed their Higher Secondary Examination on and after 2020 to be considered for admission to undergraduate courses.
- **Selection Process:** Admissions will be conducted in phases, based on available seats. If seats remain after the initial phase, a second phase will be held. The entire admissions process will be completed as per government regulations.
- **Sports Concession:** State-level position holders and national-level participants in sports will receive a 5% relaxation on their total marks for admission consideration.

Programs

- **Choice and Flexibility:** Diamond Harbour Women's University offers a comprehensive four-year undergraduate program aligned with the UGC NEP 2020 guidelines. This program provides students with the option to exit with a certificate after one year, a diploma after two years, or a full degree after four years.
- **Multidisciplinary Focus:** Students can choose from a wide range of subjects, including minors and multidisciplinary courses. The curriculum has been meticulously designed to foster a well-rounded understanding of each discipline and promote overall knowledge development.

Seats and Reservations

Diamond Harbour Women's University is dedicated to fostering a diverse and inclusive learning environment. We adhere to government regulations regarding reservations for Scheduled Caste (SC), Scheduled Tribe (ST), Other Backward Classes (OBC-A, OBC-B), and Economically Weaker Section (EWS) categories. To qualify for reserved seats, applicants must submit relevant caste and category certificates issued by the competent authority of the West Bengal Government. The university follows government guidelines for any adjustments or de-reservation of seats within these categories.

Rules Related to Registration

Eligibility:

- Applicants must have passed their Higher Secondary (10+2) examination or its equivalent to be eligible for our four-year undergraduate program.

Program Duration:

- The undergraduate program is a comprehensive program of four years duration as per NEP 2020.

Registration:

To register for the program, all students must complete an online application form and submit the following documents to the Office of the Registrar:

- Recent passport-sized photograph (two copies)
- Madhyamik Admit Card or Certificate
- Higher Secondary Mark Sheet
- Caste Certificate (if applicable)
- EWS Certificate (if applicable)
- Government-issued ID proof (Aadhar Card or Voter Card)

২। পরবর্তী নির্দেশিকা প্রকাশের আগে আপাতত স্নাতক প্রথমবর্ষ, প্রথম সেমেস্টারের পরে কোন পর্যায়ে নতুন করে নিবন্ধীকরণ করা যাবে না। তবে বিশ্ববিদ্যালয় মঞ্জুরি আয়োগের নির্দেশানুসারে নির্দিষ্ট ক্রেডিটের কোর্স করার পরে স্নাতক প্রথম, দ্বিতীয় ও তৃতীয় বর্ষে পর্যায়ক্রমে Certificate, Diploma ও Bachelors ডিগ্রি লাভের সুযোগ থাকবে।

৩। স্নাতক প্রথম সেমেস্টার থেকে অষ্টম সেমেস্টার অবধি প্রত্যেকটি সেমেস্টারে একটি করে Minor কোর্স পড়তে হবে। Minor কোর্স অবশ্যই নিজের মূল বিভাগের বাইরে থেকে পড়তে হবে। কোন একটি বিষয়ে মোট ৩২ ক্রেডিটের Minor পড়লে চূড়ান্ত ডিগ্রির ক্ষেত্রে সেই বিষয়টিকে Minor বিষয় হিসাবে দেখানোর সুযোগ থাকবে।

৪। স্নাতক প্রথম, দ্বিতীয় ও তৃতীয় সেমেস্টারে শিক্ষার্থীরা একটি করে আন্তঃবিদ্যা শৃঙ্খলা (Multidisciplinary) বিষয় পড়বে। এই বিষয়টি যেকোন বিভাগে গিয়ে পড়ার সুযোগ থাকছে।

৫। স্নাতক প্রথম এবং তৃতীয় সেমেস্টারে বাধ্যতামূলক ভাবে Ability Enhancement Course হিসাবে আধুনিক ভারতীয় ভাষা (বাংলা) এবং স্নাতক দ্বিতীয় ও চতুর্থ সেমেস্টারে বাধ্যতামূলক ভাবে Ability Enhancement Course হিসাবে ইংরাজি পড়তে হবে। এই ক্লাস গুলি সংশ্লিষ্ট বিভাগে গিয়ে করতে হবে।

৬। স্নাতক প্রথম, দ্বিতীয় ও তৃতীয় সেমেস্টারে Skill Enhancement Course প্রত্যেক শিক্ষার্থী নিজের বিভাগেই পড়বে।

৭। স্নাতক প্রথম ও দ্বিতীয় সেমেস্টারে Value added Course হিসাবে পরিবেশ বিজ্ঞান পড়তে হবে। এই কোর্স গুলি কেন্দ্রীয় ভাবে আয়োজিত হবে।

৮। স্নাতক দ্বিতীয় এবং চতুর্থ সেমেস্টারের শেষে প্রত্যেক শিক্ষার্থীরা নিজেদের পছন্দ মতন একটি বিষয়ে একমাসের বৃত্তিমূলক প্রশিক্ষণ (Vocational Training) গ্রহণ করবে। এই প্রশিক্ষণ বিশ্ববিদ্যালয়ের বা বিশ্ববিদ্যালয়ের বাইরের থেকে করা যাবে। তবে এক্ষেত্রে সংশ্লিষ্ট বিভাগ থেকে একটি করে নির্দেশিকা প্রকাশিত হবে, সেই নির্দেশ অনুযায়ীই শিক্ষার্থীরা প্রশিক্ষণ গ্রহণ করবে। প্রশিক্ষণ শেষে শিক্ষার্থীরা বিভাগে একটি বিস্তারিত প্রতিবেদন পত্র জমা করবে।

৯। পঞ্চম সেমেস্টারে শিক্ষার্থীরা একটি Internship -এ অংশ গ্রহণ করবে, এক্ষেত্রেও সংশ্লিষ্ট বিভাগ থেকে প্রকাশিত নির্দেশিকা অনুযায়ী Internship – করতে হবে। Internship – শেষে শিক্ষার্থীরা বিভাগে একটি বিস্তারিত প্রতিবেদন পত্র জমা করবে।

১০। কলা স্নাতক প্রথমবর্ষ প্রথম সেমেস্টার থেকে তৃতীয় বর্ষ ষষ্ঠ সেমেস্টার অবধি যে সকল শিক্ষার্থী মোট ৭৫% বা তার অধিক নম্বর পাবেন, তাঁদের চতুর্থ বর্ষ সপ্তম এবং অষ্টম সেমেস্টারে গবেষণা পত্র করার সুযোগ থাকবে। সপ্তম সেমেস্টারে গবেষণা কর্মের প্রস্তুতি ও গবেষণা প্রস্তাব নির্মাণ করতে হবে, অষ্টম সেমেস্টারে গবেষণা পত্রটি জমা দিতে হবে। এই দুটি সেমেস্টারেই শিক্ষার্থীদের উপস্থাপন ও মৌখিক পরীক্ষা দিতে হবে। বাকিরা সপ্তম সেমেস্টারে একটি এবং অষ্টম সেমেস্টারে দুটি কোর্স (Discipline Specific Core) অতিরিক্ত পড়বে।

১১। প্রত্যেকটি Discipline Specific Core, Minor Course, Multidisciplinary পত্রে ১০ নম্বরের অভ্যন্তরীণ মূল্যায়ণ ও ৪০ নম্বরের চূড়ান্ত মূল্যায়ণ (সময় দুই ঘন্টা) নেওয়া হবে।

১২। Ability Enhancement Course, Skill Enhancement Course, Value added Course কোর্সের ক্ষেত্রে সংশ্লিষ্ট বিভাগের তরফে পরীক্ষার নিয়ম জানানো হবে।

General Guidelines:

1. Students will have to pursue the Discipline Specific Core courses from the department they would seek admission in the Semester-I, First Year. There shall be no scope for changing the DSC (Major) subject until further notice.
2. There shall be no new registration as of now after the Semester-I, First Year, until further notice. Nevertheless, in accordance to the UGC guidelines, the students may exit with Certificate, Diploma, and Degree awards at the end of first, second, and third years respectively, subject to the fulfilment of necessary credit requirements.
3. The students will have to study one (1) Minor Course in each semester, from the First to the Eighth, and from a department excluding the one where DSC courses are being pursued. A student shall require 32 credits in the Minor Subject for the award of the final degree.
4. In the first three semesters, the student shall have to opt for three Multi-Disciplinary Courses (1 in each semester) from any department of her choice.
5. The student shall have to compulsorily study a Modern Indian Language in the First and Third Semesters, and English in the Second and Fourth Semesters, as Ability Enhancement Courses. These courses shall be taught by the respective departments.
6. In the first three semesters, the student shall compulsorily study three Skill Enhancement Courses (1 in each semester) in their respective departments, where DSC courses are being pursued.
7. The student shall compulsorily study Environmental Science in the first two semesters as Value Added Courses. These courses will be centrally arranged.
8. Each student, at the end of the Second and Fourth Semesters, shall compulsorily undertake Vocational Training of one month on a subject of their choice. This training may be availed both from the University, and external institutions. The students shall have to consult their respective departments for further guidelines, and furnish a report at the department after the completion of the course.
9. Each student shall compulsorily attend an Internship in the Fifth Semester, according to the notices issued from their respective departments, and furnish a report at the department after the completion of the course.
10. Students securing 75% marks or higher in the first six semesters (cumulatively) will be offered the scope of Research in the Seventh and Eighth Semesters in the Fourth Year. They shall study research methodology and prepare the proposal in the Seventh Semester, and submit the final dissertation in the Eighth. Presentation and Viva-Voce shall be there in both the semesters. Others, i.e. students not pursuing research shall have to study two extra Discipline Specific Core courses.
11. There shall be 10 marks of Formative (Internal) Assessment and 40 marks of End-Semester Summative Assessment (Time: Two Hours) in each Discipline Specific Core, Minor, and Multidisciplinary Courses.

Department of Political Science

Established in July 2014, the Department of Political Science has flourished into a dynamic centre for political analysis and research. The journey began with a postgraduate program at Fakir Chand College, and in 2016, it moved to a permanent home at Diamond Harbour Women's University with a dedicated faculty and a thriving student body. Today, the department boasts over 190 students, including doctoral and M.Phil. researchers, reflecting our steady growth. The department's academic offerings were expanded in 2019 to include Ph.D. and M.Phil. programs. Since that time, twenty-five Ph.D. scholars and eleven M.Phil. scholars from diverse backgrounds have been guided on their

research journeys. Access to political science knowledge was further broadened by the introduction of an undergraduate program in 2022. The Department of Political Science is distinguished by its innovative and interdisciplinary approach. A comprehensive social science perspective is emphasised by the curriculum, which is overseen by the Board of Studies (established in 2017) and the Board of Research Studies (established in 2019). This framework encourages students to be guided towards unexplored areas of political science, fostering critical thinking and groundbreaking research. Furthermore, plans are underway to establish a Centre for Dalit and Gender Studies, which will further enrich the department's research landscape. Student seminars, special lectures featuring prominent guest speakers, and diverse cultural programs are all offered. These activities serve to foster intellectual exchange and create a stimulating learning environment for the students. Department of Geography

Department of Physics

Established in 2015, the Department of Physics at Diamond Harbour Women's University has seen seven successful graduating batches. Offering both M.Sc. and Ph.D. programs, the department fosters a research-oriented environment. Students are equipped to pursue research opportunities within the

university or at other institutions after clearing national exams like GATE/NET/JRF. International research collaborations are also encouraged. FACILITIES

- i. **Seminar Room:** There are ICT-enabled Seminar rooms and conference halls to provide digital-add for lectures and discussions. Special lectures/ seminars / webinars are organised regularly in the university.
- ii. **Canteen:** The Canteen provides food at a nominal amount to students who cannot always carry food from home. Students need to pay per snack / meal to the relevant catering services.
- iii. **Purified Drinking Water:** Clean and pure drinking water is provided by the water purifiers installed in each floor of the Academic Building.
- iv. **Washrooms:** There are clean and hygiene washrooms in sufficient numbers on each floor of both the academic and administrative buildings. These are Divyangjan-friendly washrooms too.
- v. **Hostel:** The PG Girls' Hostel, inaugurated on 23rd November, 2019, has been established to provide accommodation for Post graduate students.
- vi. **Ramps:** Both the Academic Building and the Administrative Building have ramps built in to facilitate movement for differently abled students. The eight storied Academic Building is fitted with three elevators too.
- vii. **Cycle Room:** The Cycle Room is behind the canteen. It was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor Prof. Kajal De on 9th May, 2023. The size and position is well suited for the purpose of parking and securing bicycles.
- viii. **Amenities Centre:** The Amenities Centre is in the floor above the canteen. There are two rooms in the Amenities Centre. Room-1 has photocopying facilities, Bratachari practices, isolation room (for the sick with contagious diseases). Saraswati Puja is also held every year in this room. Room-2 is used for Indoor games, table tennis, carrom. Some musical instruments have been kept too to augment the cultural betterment of students.
- ix. **Medical Room, Child-Care Room and Vending Machine, Academic Building:** The Medical Room and Child-Care Room (Room No. 111) in the first floor, Academic Building, is clean and well maintained. There is a Vending machine in the first-floor toilet.
- x. **Central Library:** The Central Library in the ground floor, Academic Building, provides a vibrant space for exploration, learning, and knowledge creation. At the heart of academic excellence, the Diamond Harbour Women's University Central Library offers a comprehensive collection of books and fosters a dynamic environment for research and discovery.

Student Grievance Redressal Committee (SGRC)

A Student Grievance Redressal Committee (SGRC) has been set up at the University in accordance with the University Grants Commission (Redressal of Grievances of Students) Regulations, 2023 (D.O. No F.1-13/2022 (CP-II) dated 12th April, 2023). The Student Grievance Redressal Committee (SGRC) attends to the grievances and complaints made by students regarding academic matters, library and other facilities for the students. Using an unbiased approach, the Committee ensures effective solution to the grievances. The Committee enables the students to express their grievances by initiating and following the grievance redressal procedure in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Diamond Harbour Women's University. The committee meets periodically, examines the nature and pattern of the grievances and redresses it accordingly. Any student with a genuine grievance may approach Student Grievance Redressal Committee to submit her grievances.

The **objectives** of the SGRC include:

- ✚ Ensuring effective solution to the students' grievances with an impartial and fair approach and in complete confidentiality.

- ✚ Enlightening the students regarding their duties and responsibilities.
- ✚ Encouraging the students to express their grievances/problems freely and frankly, without any fear of being victimized.
- ✚ To document students' grievances/complaints and to ensure reasonable solutions for further improvement of academic and administrative environment in the University.

The Internal Complaints Committee (ICC)

Being the first women's University of eastern India, its objective has always been the empowerment of young women and ensuring their independence and selfhood in the society. This has been attained by providing safe work place for all. For the security of the women student and staff there is an active Internal Complaints Committee from the initial days of the University. The Internal Complaints Committee was formed in 2017 in accordance with UGC Guidelines and in compliance with The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013. While the primary purpose of this committee is to sort out issues of sexual harassment within

the University campus, this body has also organized sensitization programs for students, faculty and staff on a regular basis. The Committee has organized webinar during the pandemic period to find ways and means to combat domestic violence which was at a rise during the said period. The Committee is vigilant and responsible for the smooth and safe functioning of the University.

Psychological Counselling

The Neotia University has kindly offered to provide full support regarding psychological counselling for the benefits of the students. Those who are in distress will receive the help of professional psychiatrists. Students may avail of the outpatient department (OPD) of the special clinical unit at a nominal cost. They are directed to register their names through Dr. Tania Chakraverty, Dean of Students' Welfare.

Strict Prohibition of Ragging

✚ **Ragging** is strictly prohibited.

✚ According to the **UGC Regulation on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Institutions, 2009**, ragging constitutes one or more of any of the following acts:

- A. Any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.
- B. Indulging in rowdy or indisciplined activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student.
- C. Asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
- D. Any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher.
- E. Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- F. Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students.
- G. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person.
- H. Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, posts, or public insults would also include deriving perverted pleasure, and vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student.

- I. Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying and exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of color, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.

Punishments accorded

According to the UGC Regulation on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009, depending on the nature and gravity of the guilt established by the Anti-Ragging Squad, those found guilty may be awarded one or more of the following punishments, namely;

- Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
- Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits.
- Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or another evaluation process.
- Withholding results.
- Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.
- Cancellation of admission.
- Rustication from the institution for periods ranging from one to four semesters.
- Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period.

Measures for the prohibition of ragging. What can the student do?

UGC has established an **Anti-Ragging toll-free "helpline" 1800-180-5522** in **12 languages** for helping victims of ragging. The UGC has developed an **Anti-Ragging Website - <https://www.antiragging.in/>**. The Portal contains the record of registered complaints received and the status of the action taken thereon. Videos on Anti ragging are available on the UGC website. The Hon'ble Chief Minister of West Bengal, Smt. Mamata Banerjee has launched an anti-ragging helpline for students of all educational institutions in the state. Students facing ragging can contact police officials through the helpline number **18003455678**. There are provisions in the IPC, which can be used by a student to register an FIR in the nearest Police Station. These provisions are:

- 294 – Obscene acts and songs
- 323 – Punishment for voluntarily causing hurt
- 324 – Voluntarily causing hurt by dangerous weapon or means
- 325 – Punishment for voluntarily causing grievous hurt
- 326 – Voluntarily causing grievous hurt by dangerous weapon
- 339 – Wrongful Restraint
- 340 – Wrongful Confinement
- 341 – Punishment for Wrongful Restraint
- 342 – Punishment for Wrongful Confinement
- 506 – Punishment for culpable homicide not amounting to murder

A student seeking admission to the hostel will have to submit an **affidavit** along with her application for hostel accommodation that she is aware of the anti-ragging law in this regard and agrees to abide by the punishment meted out if she is found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging (as per AICTE Requirements).
